Greetings, HOG Friends,

Well, Gang, as you may know now, K Swan and I returned from our venture to the 'Roaming the Black Hills HOG Touring Rally' after about 12 days' travel. And what an adventure we had. Not only did we get to ride through almost all day rain, but we also got to experience freezing rain and hail when traversing the Bighorn Mountains from Cody, WY, to Gillette.

Now, I always have my rain gear available in my saddlebag, even here in Arizona. But it hardly ever comes out of its bag. Well, I employed it the whole second day. We were lucky enough, however, that the rain gave us a break when we rode through Monument Valley. What a beautiful place!

Disaster of disasters, I had by this time lost the outdated controller to my heated jacket liner and so had to bundle up with everything I could find. But when I got to the Deluxe Harley Davidson dealer in Gillette—Lo and Behold!—they still had some heated gear left and a jacket in my very size! Which I swiftly snapped up and employed the next day. And will vastly appreciate around here next winter, if not before.

So, Swan has become an expert at the Harley Ride Planner on the new Skyline OS Navigation System. It seems that every time I tried to send a ride to my bike, it defaulted to the last one I rode. Tried to make me go back and ride it all over again. Go figure. It seems that you have to perform steps in exactly the right sequence or else! I believe I eventually got it figured out, but sometimes it throws some punches. For example, when negotiating the twin roundabouts at an I-25 interchange, Swan missed the cue and left me going around and around and—about five rotations—until she managed to turn around somewhere and get back on track. Did I feel foolish? Another time we missed the turn on to the 470 Expressway around Denver and got sent into the hinterlands. But no worry! Harley RP eventually figured it out.

But back to the trip! I have to say that the most beautiful place I rode through, IMHO, was the Wind River Canyon in Wyoming on our way to Cody, where the rally began. I could ride that road every day and not tire of it. Wow. Get up there if you can. There is even a scenic railroad you can take, I understand.

The aforementioned freezing rain and hail happened at Granite Pass over the Bighorn Mountains. (This was *before* I replaced my heated jacket liner.) We're riding along and then little rocks start hitting our face shields. No. Can't be happening, I'm trying to think. But it *was* indeed happening. Lucky for us, it didn't last long. The riders who chose the alternate route through the mountains actually had measurable snow and had to turn around. I don't even know how I could have accomplished that.



Wind River Canyon, Wyoming






Once at Deadwood (and after we finally figured out where to park, seeing as how the hotel/casino complex had decided to block off half of the lot for some kind of renovation), our longest riding day took us down to Mt. Rushmore, which I had never seen before. How wonderful to have that memorial. We also stopped at a viewpoint by Devil's Tower. This whole area has some unbelievable rock formations. Finally, we decided *not* to try Needles Highway, but rode down to Custer State Park and then rode north on Iron Mountain Road. This byway consists mostly of extreme curves. Not just curves, but—like I explained at the meeting—you curl around and then go under the bridge that you just went over in little loop-de-loops. About 4 times! Plus, you go through several one-lane tunnels. When you exit two of these, you see Mt. Rushmore *right there in your face*! Unfortunately, neither one of us has a GoPro camera to capture these sights. You just have to keep it stored in your own memory.

On our final rally riding day, unfortunately, the winds were unbelievably strong, with gusts up to and above 50 mph, I'm told. So, we skipped the other suggested ride to the Badlands (which is wide open, I guess) and decided to ride up and down Spearfish Canyon. While not as spectacular as Wind River Canyon, this stretch is truly scenic. We stopped to see a pretty waterfall and enjoyed riding beside the creeks—something we don't get to do here in Arizona.

I have to give credit to Harley's HOG leaders for putting together rides such as these touring rallies. They don't actually stage guided rides, but they obtain accommodations, arrange for some dealership-sponsored dinners. plan fun evening get-togethers and research lots of options for your riding pleasure. I highly recommend joining a touring rally in the future if you can. There were several HOG Chapters that included numerous riders, which I'm sure made it fun for them. And some people came all by themselves. I am really grateful that I went, and I have to thank Kathy the Swan for noodling at me until I said 'OK. OK. I'll go!' If the ride had come a bit later in the season, we might have taken a more circuitous ride home, but as we could see snow-capped mountains through Colorado, we just bombed down I-25 and then Rte. 60 and on home. Ending our trip in 110 degree weather. From one extreme to the other!

Well, I've gone beyond my page allocation. So, see you at the next meeting or the next ride.

Once again, I was honored to sit down and interview one of our members. June's Person of Interest is Peter Gibson and below is his story. Enjoy!

On June 21st we had ten HOG members show up at Zona Tactical Range to shoot some guns and have fun. And what fun we had. I had a new Springfield Kuna 9mm that resembles an AK47. Everyone who wanted to shoot it got a chance and even one of the range officers tried and liked it.

Person Of Interest

Peter Gibson

Peter Gibson was born on 05-09-60 in Orange, New Jersey. He has two older brothers, David and Jay, and one younger sister, Pam.

Peter's dad worked in Manhattan, and they lived 60 miles outside Manhattan. Their home was where the New York Jets currently have their training camp in Florham Park.

Peter lived there until he was 21 years old. Peter's high school sweetheart was a girl called Nicci. In high school, Peter was in the choir and theatre. He was in the play Godspell in which the school had pro choreographers come in to teach them.

Peter's first paying job was at summer camp. His parents sent him to summer camp in New Jersey. His cousin went to camp in Winooski, Vermont, near Lake Champlain, and at 14 years old he got to go to camp there. He liked it so much he told his parents, "Don't come and get me".

The next year he went back and became a counselor-in-training. There was a tennis pro there and Peter played tennis. Peter was then hired to be a full-time counselor. When the tennis pro left camp, Peter was hired as the tennis instructor at 16 years old.

At the age of 12, Peter's parents had enrolled him in a USTA (United States Tennis Association) Junior Development Program. It paid off, his first year in high school he started immediately in varsity. He played throughout high school, in college and in various USTA tournaments. He plays here in Tucson at the Academy Village where he lives, a 55+ community. He also plays a little pickleball but prefers tennis.



Peter is musically inclined. He played guitar and still plays today. He owns a Gibson Les Paul, a Yamaha Acoustic, and a 1969 electric Fender Jazz Bass.



After high school Peter's parents paid for him to go to college. He attended Morris County Community College in New Jersey and studied Humanities and Social Sciences.

Peter decided to leave college and start his own company with his friend doing carpentry. They bought a van and tools and started doing additions and renovations.

During this time period he married his first wife, Ann, in 1981. She was a nurse by trade and their marriage produced four kids: Beth, Drew, Meredith, and Ned. Peter and Ann divorced after 20 years of marriage.

One day while 20' in the air on a ladder while it was snowing, he had an epiphany. He didn't want to do this type of work any longer. He went back to school while working part-time doing health care helping people, something he loved to do.

Peter finished his associates degree and transferred to Rutgers University. He wanted to go into Psychology but changed to Economics and English. He graduated from Rutgers in 1986.

After graduation, Peter got his first job as an office/business manager for Fenton Construction Co. in New Jersey. He then became an estimator and then a project manager. When the Vice President of Marketing announced his retirement, the Company asked Peter to accept that role, which he did.

Five years later Peter got recruited by the Kipcon Engineering Company as a sales manager to consolidate all their services. The company grew from 20 to 100 employees in less than a year. Kipcon then started a construction company and Peter was made the General Manager. Approximately three years later he went to a larger firm.






He then worked for Ebasco (Electric Bond & Share Company formed in 1905 by Thomas Edison). He worked in the Marketing Department as a Proposal Manager.

Ebasco was acquired by a company named Raytheon, who renamed the company to Raytheon Engineers & Constructors. While working for Raytheon, Peter was recruited by the Vice President and General Counsel to work in the corporate legal department as a Contracts Manager.

Every seven years, the company he worked for was acquired by a larger firm—first EBASO became Raytheon Engineers & Constructors, then Washington Group, followed by URS, and eventually AECOM.

Peter retired as a Senior Legal Contracts Manager from AECOM, a Fortune 200 company in January of 2017 at the age of 56.



Peter was retired for a few years but ended up going back to work under a 6-month consulting agreement with United Engineers & Constructors. His past boss had passed away suddenly, and the company needed legal support on two large transmission projects in Florida.

In June of 2023 Peter and Dee moved to Tucson, AZ. Four of his nine grandkids live here & he wanted to be close to them.

INJURIES: At 9 years old Peter broke his leg skiing. As a first grader, he was riding his bicycle on Hillside Avenue when his neighbor's dog ran out in front of him causing him to hit the dog throwing Peter over the handlebars, receiving a severe concussion which kept him out of first grade. He had to repeat that grade. The dog lived.

TRAVELS: Peter has been to all 48 continental U.S. states, most of them on his motorcycle. He has visited Bermuda, Canada, England, France, Japan, Mexico, Puerto Rico, St. Martin (a French West Indies colony), and Scotland. He has even been to Detroit, where he was flown in & out while he worked on a project for Detroit Edison.

HOBBIES: Peter loves to ski, play golf, play his guitars, pickleball, softball and tennis. He is also passionate

about touring on his Harley and hiking. But most importantly he loved being a Camp Counselor for the MDA Camp (Muscular Dystrophy).

COLLECTIONS: Peter has a collection of artwork made by children with neuromuscular diseases.

MEMBERSHIPS: Peter has been a HOG Director, Road Captain, Head Road Captain, MDA Liaison, and Activities Officer. He is a current Tucson HOG member and Road Captain. Peter is very








active with the MDA (Muscular Dystrophy Association) and volunteers at fundraisers and is personally responsible for raising over \$75,000 over the past 10 years.

MOTORCYCLES: Peter's first motorcycle was a 1986 Honda Shadow. His first Harley-Davidson was a 2002 Softail which he still has. It has 108,000 miles on it. He also owns a 2005 Sportster which he says is his wife Dee's bike. And his current Harley is a 2015 Street Glide CVO with 90,000 miles on it.

NICKNAMES: Peter says he doesn't have any nicknames.

BUCKETLIST: He wants to go to Alaska and Hawaii to complete all 50 U.S. states. He and his wife Dee have been to 35 out of the 63 U.S. National Parks and they'd like to go to all of them. This September Peter rented a houseboat and is going to Voyager's National Park in Minnesota.


